Mervyn Bishop: Close Up

Mervyn Bishop is one of Australias most important photographers. His extraordinary archive of more than 200,000 images makes a landmark addition to the State Library of NSW's collection. Mervyn Bishop: Close Up celebrates the historic moments and pivotal people he famously captured, while exploring the private influences that shaped his groundbreaking career. This intimate exhibition offers a rare glimpse of the man behind the lens and honours the enduring legacy of Australia's first Aboriginal press photographer.

PIX – The magazine that changed everything (1938–1972)

PIX – Australia's first pictorial news weekly – hit newsstands around the country in January 1938. With its eye-catching lipstick-red logo, PIX delivered a new style of journalism, using photographs to tell daring stories of modern life. Always intended to shock, entertain and inform, PIX stayed popular with its readers for over 30 years. This exhibition explores the PIX story – through the people and pictures that made the magazine – for the first time. The photos have been picked by Library staff as some of the best shots from 167,000 of images in the PIX negative archive. These pictures show the extraordinary talent of PIX photographers and tell incredible stories from Australian life.

In 1985, Kogler had an exhibition at the Gracie Mansion gallery in the East Village and spent a few months in New York – a time that significantly shaped his subsequent artistic development. With his camera, he documented the city's vibrant art and music scene at a time of profound social and technological upheaval. The exhibition interweaves these early photographs with expansive wallpaper installations.

CLAUDIA HART – Patterns and Politics

Patterns and Politics is the first museum retrospective of the work of US media artist Claudia Hart. Since the mid-1990s, she has constructed complex scenarios in virtual 3D spaces in which mathematical structures, scientific models, and the visual rhetoric of consumer society are abstracted and merged. This creates dense, mythologically charged worlds in which virtual bodies, ornament, and algorithmic processes are inextricably intertwined. A simulated eye – the virtual camera – records these worlds; the resulting rendered sequences form the basis for Hart's films, installations, pigment prints, rapid-prototype sculptures, quilts, augmented reality wallpapers, and paintings.

On the trail of a family photo: When Ulrike Wieser came across a photo of her father's cousin, Elfi Schlager, it brought to light a buried chapter in her family history. Elfi was ten years old when she and 66 other residents of the St. Joseph Institute in Mils/Tyrol were taken to the Hartheim killing facility and murdered there. To this day, the victims of Nazi medical crimes remain on the margins of memory.

Where Have All The Flowers Gone ... 80 years after the war – photographs by Roger Cremers

To mark the eightieth anniversary of the end of World War II in 1945, the Jewish Museum Vienna is putting on a photo exhibition dealing with European memory culture and the aftermath of the Shoah and the war today. In his series "World War Two Today," the Dutch photographer Roger Cremers (b. 1972) has been taking pictures since 2008 of historically contaminated landscapes, former theaters of war, and memorials in Europe in search of answers to the question of how postwar societies have been dealing with the legacy of the greatest disasters of the twentieth century.

Starting in the 1920s and extending into the early 1940s, he took their portraits on festive days, during their work, and in everyday situations. The remarkable photographs have survived on approximately 500 glass negatives in the 9×12 cm format.

Early Gaze – Unseen Photography from the 19th Century

Drawing upon the rich collection of the National Gallery of Canada, Camera and the City brings together the work of a wide range of photographers who have captured the spirit of city streets. The exhibition is divided into three sections exploring the city as movement and theatre, the city as idea, and the city as community. Often resulting in experimental material processes, these photographs shift our understanding of urban imagery. The City as Community highlights the need for human connection, capturing gatherings of families and diverse communities, along with back streets and alleys and their less familiar narratives.

Jin-me Yoon: Honouring a Long View

The series addressed the lingering effects of colonialism and militarism that are cloaked by the natural beauty and touristic lure of the Pacific Rim National Park Reserve in British Columbia. Staged on Nuu-chah-nulth ancestral lands, the giant mound represents an ephemeral monument, counterpointing official accounts that either mask violence or erase the turbulent personal histories experienced by the first wave of Koreans to Canada following the nation's centennial in 1967.

A Microhistory of Photography

Microscopic research of historical photographs has become the domain of photo conservators, whether in determining the material composition or investigating the nature and extent of individual damages. Historians and theorists of photography, on the other hand, reach for a magnifying glass or microscope much less often and inevitably miss many seemingly insignificant details. Using the example of several photographs and photomechanical prints from the second half of the 19th and early 20th centuries, the exhibition and the catalogue show what can be revealed – imperceptible to the naked eye – with the help of magnifying glasses and high-resolution image sensors.

Richard Homola: Testimony of the Terezín Walls

A collection of black-and-white photographs by Richard Homola from 2013 to 2023 captures authentic inscriptions, scratches and drawings left by prisoners in the premises of the former Terezín ghetto. The exhibited paintings are mainly original black and white authorial prints - contact copies from film negatives of large format 18×24 and 20×25 cm. This technique is over a hundred and seventy years old and allows you to capture a number of details that often escape the viewer present at the scene of the film. The exhibition is complemented by large-format magnifications of selected paintings, photographs of the current state of Terezín exteriors and demonstrations of photographic technology.

Rudolf Jung: Photographs of iron and silver

Exhibition of photographs by a prominent Czech photographer and member of the Association of Professional Photographers. Why iron and silver? A common photograph in recent times was created mainly with the help of silver in the form of halogens that are sensitive to light. The halogens scattered in the gelatin emulsion were applied to the clear pad, and so a photographic film was made. In the time of photographic prehistory, photographers had to produce such materials themselves. The English scientist Sir John Frederick William Herschel has devised procedures where silver is replaced by other chemical elements. One of them called it a cyanotype and used iron to break the painting.

Marc-Oliver Schulz - Wasserland

Vast expanse, water, and ceaseless change characterize the Wadden Sea – a land-scape remade by the rhythm of the tides every six hours. Alfred Ehrhardt once saw it as "elemental forces at work." Hamburg photographer Marc-Oliver Schulz views the tidal flats in a different light. He is also repeatedly drawn to the North Sea coast, but unlike Alfred Ehrhardt, his attention is focused not on structures or moods, but on the act of seeing itself. His series Wasserland (Water Land), comprising thirty-five photographs, is being exhibited in Berlin for the first time.

Alfred Ehrhardt: Ernst Barlach Photography and Film 1948/49

Born in Triptis, Alfred Ehrhardt (1901-1984) was one of the few Bauhaus students who earned his living exclusively as a filmmaker and photographer. In 1948, with the support of the British occupation authorities, he founded his own cultural film production company in Hamburg. His first post-war works include a film about the Bordesholm Altar in Schleswig and a two-part cultural film about the life and work of the German sculptor, draughtsman and writer Ernst Barlach (1870-1938). At the time, Ehrhardt was regarded as the "most important German post-war cultural film creator".

With a sensitivity to detail, Dutch photographer Sarah van Rij (*1990) creates fragmentary, timeless, and mysterious compositions that reveal the poetic potential of everyday life. Her shadow theater unfolds through a play of light and dark, form and color, in which silhouettes and recurring objects set the rhythm of a visual score. HUMMING FROM THE SHADOWS at the Studio at the Hall for Contemporary Art is van Rij's first solo exhibition in Germany and features more than twenty works, some of them large formats, from the last seven years.

The exhibition "Harry Gruyaert. A World in Colour" shows around 120 images by the Belgian artist and European pioneer of colour photography. Harry Gruyaert created most of his extensive body of work during his trips to countries such as Egypt, India, Morocco, the US, Russia, Spain or France. With his extraordinary sense for composing colour and space, he captures landscapes and urban scenes, emphasising contrasts: the play of light and shadow in an airport terminal, the intense yellow of an American vintage car, the vibrant colours of Moroccan streets or the muted tones of Belgian landscapes.

Smile! How the Smile Came Into Photography

Smizing, squinching, duck face, fish gape, cheese, or prunes: Beauty ideals and social media have given rise to increasingly mercurial trends in portrait photography. Until the late nineteenth century, having one's photo taken required the sitter to remain absolutely motionless in order to produce a sharp image, which more often than not resulted in a fixed and lifeless expression. Smile! investigates how our "photographic faces" have evolved over time. The show assembles a range of anonymous and artistic portrait photographs from the nineteenth to the twenty-first century to recount a history of the smile.

The French photographer Sophie Ristelhueber is the 2025 Hasselblad Award laureate – the world's most prestigious photography prize. American artist Man Ray (1890–1976) was a visionary known for his radical experiments that pushed the limits of photography, painting, sculpture, and film. In the winter of 1921, he pioneered the rayograph, a new twist on a technique used to make photographs without a camera. By placing objects on or near a sheet of light-sensitive paper, which he exposed to light and developed, Man Ray turned recognizable subjects into wonderfully mysterious compositions. Introduced in the period between Dada and Surrealism, the rayographs' transformative, magical qualities led the poet Tristan Tzara to describe them as capturing the moments "when objects dream."
